

275 proudly lend a hand in Parish Day of Service

ur first Parish Day of Service on May 23 came off beautifully with the enthusiastic participation by 275 parishioners who worked in 25 locations throughout Medina.

The weather was a perfect 71 degrees and sunny as crews gathered at 8:30 a.m. in the church basement to register, collect their T-shirts and water bottles, get instructions and pray before heading out to their work assignments. The scenario repeated at 12:30 p.m. for afternoon work assignments.

Our participants were excited to get to work helping others in Medina. As some crews finished their work early, they returned to ask what more they could do. When the parks turned out to be cleaner than expected, several families took the lead in finding new locations in need, including fields and marsh areas near the Medina Community Recreation Center. They filled three large garbage bags and even fished a tire out of the marsh.

Those who participated included young families who pushed strollers while their children learned about service, families with teens preparing for confirmation and senior citizens who were happy to sit and clean muddy pinwheels and toys for the Medina County Children's Center. Several people collaborated to bring a fellow parishioner who doesn't drive so she could participate in our morning prayers and rosary.

The crew of older children and adults at Cups Café scraped then painted about half the building's exterior, giving the nonprofit a fresh new look. We are looking at a "mini Day of Service" in early August to finish the job. Watch the bulletin for details if you are able to lend a hand.

Participants returned for 5 p.m. Mass, wearing their yellow Parish Day of Service shirts and beaming with joy from their day's work, knowing they made life a little better for some of our most vulnerable neighbors. We relaxed with pizza and

Music minister * joins parish staff

new chapter in our parish's 155-year history begins this month with the appointment of Ryan Neal to lead our praise and worship in song.

Ryan, who turns 32 in August, joins us from Bellevue, where he served as director of liturgy at Immaculate Conception Parish for the last three-and-a-half years. He started here July 1 as director of music ministries.

"I'm really excited," he says. "I've built some strong friendships that I'm going to miss, but I'm looking forward to being in a very vibrant and active parish."

Ryan grew up in Norwalk, where his parents still live, and has an older sister and brother, and a younger brother. He graduated from Ohio Northern University with a bachelor's degree in music, specializing in organ performance. He has played the piano since he was 5 and played the French horn through college.

He has played music for churches since he was 15. And, although he grew up Episcopalian, he joined the Catholic Church in 2012.


At Immaculate Conception, a parish of about 1,200 families, he led a traditional choir that got "amped up" at Christmas and Easter with more members who didn't have the time to sing more often. "I could take a regular group of six or eight and turn it into a group of 30," he says.

"I've also returned children's choirs to the school liturgies, working with the music teacher at the school," he adds. Immaculate Conception had two gradeschool choirs, one for grades three and four, and another for grades five

through eight. For Christmas, he led a 50-member parish children's choir: "It was the first time in almost a decade they'd had a children's choir."

He's also passionate about community and semi-professional theater work, having worked as a music director for more than 150 productions. He's looking forward to getting involved with theater groups in Akron and his new hometown of Medina.

"It's a wonderful opportunity; I'm really excited," Ryan says. "It feels right."

Children climb closer to God

t was warm and sultry outside, but inside our Vacation Bible School last month, teachers were wearing their snow gear and talking about sledding.

During the Everest-themed week of morning activities, more than 125 children studied God's power, courage, care, forgiveness and love. They learned they could overcome any obstacle with God's awesome power. The Xavier Room was turned into a mountaintop base camp, where the children gathered to learn about the latest mishaps of Gina and Deanna (Paulette Kerns and Sue Rohe-Brooks) and Father Thom – wearing a stocking cap and suspenders – led them in prayer. Snow-capped mountain peaks adorned the hallways.

Children learned Bible stories of how God provided for and spoke to Elijah and healed Naaman, that Jesus died on a cross to save us from our sins, and that he promises us an eternal home.

"In heaven, we're all friends with one another and we share," Father Thom explained later in his classroom, as he handed out warm crocheted blankets to the children as they sat on the floor. "And boys and girls, in heaven, God's going to provide us all the rich foods – so today we have chocolate chip cookies!"

And, to make sure no one was left out, he gave a child with a peanut allergy a glow-stick bracelet.

"And God will generously provide all that you need." (2 Corinthians 9:8)















Construction continues across the campus

ork on the new vestibule on the west side of the church building got under way in June with the demolition of the crumbling ramp. Once gas and water mains were relocated, the bricklayers arrived to lay concrete blocks for the foundation of the addition that will house stairs to the church and basement, as well as a wheelchair lift.

Concrete footers were poured, walls were waterproofed and the area was backfilled with gravel and dirt. Soon, the bricklayers will return to lay brick for the exterior of the addition, which will match the existing church exterior. Work is expected to be completed this fall.

Meanwhile, 11 windows were replaced in three first-floor classrooms and one upstairs hallway of the school. With these new installations, the school now has all updated windows with much greater energy-efficiency than the original ones.

The windows were purchased through grant money allocated to the parish through the diocesan Rooted in Faith – Forward in Hope campaign. Thank you for your generous stewardship of your treasure to provide these necessary improvements.

Lastly, Medina City Schools is replacing the two trailers that were stationed on the east side of the gym with a single, large unit to house the Learning Center. One of the trailers had been there more than 20 years! The center provides such state-funded services as speech therapy, tutoring, psychological assessments, learning intervention and more.

We all look forward to these projects being completed and appreciate your continued patience while the work is in progress.

bout 35 teens in our annual Edge Camps spent a week in July learning more about people in our area in need and the social service agencies that serve them.

Led by Sue Rohe-Brooks, our director of religious education, the teens traveled to the Cosgrove Center in Cleveland, where they sorted clothes and interacted with the clients. They also played wiffle ball with residents of the Medina County Home, made crafts with residents of Brookdale South nursing home in Medina, worked with children and spread mulch at Country Life Kids Camp, participated in a talent show at the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities, and more. They also made time for fun with teambuilding exercises at Camp Christopher and a day at Fun 'n' Stuff in Macedonia.

- 9. Entry must have label attached to the upper left corner on the back of artwork.
