

# Building and Rebuilding, in Gratitude

A letter from our pastor



As 2016 draws to a close, I want to thank you for your generous support throughout the year. With your help, we have been able to accomplish a great deal. Your contributions have allowed us to preach the Gospel and offer the Eucharist at our church and eight or nine nursing facilities, extend comfort and aid to the sick and dying, educate our children, teens and families, provide shelter to the homeless, and reach out to the community.

We even opened our doors for four nights to welcome all to be inspired by Father Larry Richards during the parish mission.

Here at the campus, last year about this time we started using our beautiful new west vestibule, which allowed us to make a safer, covered and more accessible entrance into our church from the parking lot. The addition of a lift satisfied the government's requirement of a second handicapped-accessible entrance (the other being our elevator), and the two-story entry offers a bright and welcoming passageway into the church. All this work was made possible through the generosity of everyone here who contributed to the diocesan Rooted in Faith, Forward in Hope campaign.

A lot of the work to our physical plant here hasn't been nearly so exciting. We replaced windows in the rectory, air conditioning units in the church and school, and sound systems in the church and Xavier Room. We repaired mortar joints between the bricks and resealed crevices to keep the school and church from crumbling and air from leaking out and water leaking in. It's not the kind of thing to "write home about," but, quite honestly, it was long overdue.

We're in much better shape today, but we're not done. The east entrance to the church – the exterior steps leading to the parking lot – must be addressed very soon. The outdoor steps have taken the same beating from the weather and salt as the old ramp that disintegrated on the other side. You know I remain very concerned

about the tricky first step as people leave — too many people have missed it and taken a tumble. Fixing it must involve updates to and expansion of the original kitchen below, where hefty wooden beams are holding up the ceiling.

To accomplish all that, I am considering options that would extend the east vestibule toward Washington Street. Such a plan could create space for restrooms on the main level. I'd also like to update the restrooms in the basement, and add a covered entry way and stairway into the church. I've begun to meet with an architect to see what all this might cost, but it could easily top \$1 million.

This is where you come in: If you are thinking about making charitable contributions this time of year to reduce your tax bill in 2017, I'd like to ask you to consider donating to this major capital improvement.

Your contributions make it possible to extend the life of our church building, improve accessibility and add much-needed amenities that are no longer wants but needs today. Sixty years ago, no one perceived the need for more reasonably located restrooms, and the kitchen size was adequate. But today, we continually encounter obstacles by our lack of such things.

People are always thanking me for making improvements at the parish, to the parking lot, to the this, or that, or whatever. It's only possible because you financially supported the endeavor. And, to the extent that you continue to do so, we can make improvements to all the buildings for worship, gathering, education, and service to those in need.

# Legacy gifts honor deceased, continue God's work

Susan Morrissey grew up in St. Francis Xavier Parish and lived most of her adult life as an active parishioner here. Her father, Bernie Coudriet, even helped build our church in the late 1950s.



So, when Sue died Sept. 13 of cancer at age 59, her family says it was only natural to honor her by directing contributions

to St. Francis Xavier Parish.

The Morrisseys are among the most recent examples of families who have arranged lasting tributes as a way to not only remember their loved ones but contribute to continuing the important work of building Christ's kingdom here in Medina. These gifts reflect their gratitude for a lifetime of pastoral care by the Church in ministering to loved ones through the sacraments, personal growth and spiritual enrichment.

St. Francis Xavier Parish was a source of community and strength throughout Sue's life, says her husband, Tim. She attended the parish school through the fifth grade, Sue and Tim were married in our church, and both their children attended the school through the eighth grade. During Sue's illness, Tim says, the parish community - including her renewal sisters and many other parishioners - was "constantly looking out for us."

"Fr. Tony and Deacon Joe visited her, brought communion and prayed with us," Tim says. "During an extended stay

at Medina Hospital, several ministers of Holy Communion visited and distributed the Sacrament. The beauty of the funeral Mass Fr. Tony presided over is beyond words."

"I shudder wondering how anyone would get through an experience like this without faith and a faith community," he adds. "Asking that memorial contributions be made to St. Francis Xavier was our way of supporting a community that supported us, in good times and bad, throughout our married

Memorial and legacy gifts are a way to express Christian stewardship as coworkers with God and sharing our gifts in love and justice with others. Ideally, that stewardship impacts all phases of our life, including our plans for the use of our worldly goods and resources even after our death.



Many parishioners, such as Julie Gaume, who died April 1, 2015, at age 75, have remembered St. Francis Xavier in their estate. Such a gift allows individuals to demonstrate their commitment to God's work through the Church by making a meaningful financial gift that might have been hard or even impossible during their lifetime.

Julie had started the Sunday School program many years ago at our parish, served on the Stewardship Committee, shared her faith as a Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults sponsor and belonged to a parish Women's Bible Study group. She felt blessed by God and wanted to share those blessings with



the Matia family chose still another way to establish a lasting tribute following the death last year of 25-year-old Paul Matia.

Paul, who had attended St. Francis Xavier School from the second grade through the sixth grade, died Nov. 9 from a congenital heart defect. Paul, who had severe dyslexia, went on to become valedictorian of his 2009 class at the Lawrence School in Sagamore Hills and captain of its basketball team. He graduated in 2013 from Xavier University, where he was the mascot for two years while studying accounting and international business.

Gary Unsdorfer and Ric Benninger, whose own sons had attended school here and played CYO basketball with Paul, raised money to establish an annual \$500 scholarship at St. Francis Xavier School in Paul's name. The scholarship will be awarded to a seventh-grader who has done something to help his peers, as Paul often did, and who plans to complete the eighth grade here.

"When I heard the news that Paul had passed away pretty unexpectedly, it hit me pretty hard, knowing I have a son that age and knowing how devastating that can be," says Gary Unsdorfer, DPM. "You want to do something, and the thought was this is a good way to keep his memory alive and his memory around."

He hopes that, one day, Paul's classmates may have children enrolled in our school who may come to know Paul Matia through the scholarship. "It was a really easy decision as to where we were going to have the scholarship," adds Gary, whose wife Jane has taught many years in our school. "It made his parents happy to know that people cared enough."

Paul's father, Dr. James Matia, DDS, says he hopes the scholarship rewards the student who is "the good kid in the community who will always help the younger ones out, who's not a bully, who doesn't make fun of other people, who's inclusive. We think that was how Paul was."

## Choir lifts hearts, voices to God

### Music is a very personal thing.

Every note brims with hope that it glorifies God and helps to elevate our worship. It takes preparation and dedication to the team and the craft.

Those who belong to the music ministry here at St. Francis Xavier Parish, though, say it is an experience like none other, and they are grateful for the opportunity to spend time together worshiping God through song.

Judy Gainard joined choir 28 years ago, after her renewal sister Donna Bica invited her to join. "Singing in the choir gives me an opportunity to express my love for the Lord," Judy says. "The words to the songs jump out at me. Sometimes when we sing certain songs, I get emotional and

have tears in my eyes. There is a lot of joy in fulfilling the calling to give praise to the Lord."

Carl and Kathy Becks have belonged to the choir nearly as long as Judy. Rehearsals became a sort of "date night" for the couple, as it was a ministry they could do together. "I feel singing well at Mass and praising God while leading the congregation in song is a great joy," Carl says. "The choir members are caring people who love to sing. I enjoy the social contact and choir gettogethers – great food!"



Not everyone has been in the choir for decades. Marcia Hill joined less than two years ago because she thought the choir sounded beautiful, and she was annoyed that those sitting in the pews around her weren't singing. "I enjoy singing with a group," she says. "I never did that before."

Pete Danszczak, a cantor and member of the traditional choir, sees his singing as an opportunity to fulfill his stewardship commitment by using the gifts with which God's blessed him to benefit our parish community. "I enjoy praying this way," he explains.

Ryan Neal, our director of music, would like more parishioners to join the ministry. He envisions a large traditional choir that, on occasion, can sing multi-part harmonies and elaborate compositions. Singers need not be experienced – they just need a love of singing and willingness to prepare.

"If you're unable to make the weekly commitment for the traditional choir, there are opportunities to join us for Christmas and Holy Week," he adds.

The traditional choir sings at the 10 a.m. Mass, September through April, and rehearses at 7:45 p.m. Thursdays in the choir loft. The youth choir sings at the noon Mass twice each month. Cantors sing at the 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. Masses, although a group could be formed for either Mass if singers are available.

The daughter of a trained vocalist who sang throughout Cleveland, Lucy Mahoney recalls her father's "magnificent" voice and says she enjoys sharing God's message through music. "It seemed natural for me to participate in the music program at St. Francis Xavier," she says. "I wanted to do what I could to help."







On Dec. 3, the feast of St. Francis Xavier, our parish will host a Lessons and Carols program of music preceded by the blessing of our new patronal saint statue near the church's west entrance. A catered meal of heavy appetizers and desserts will be served in our lower church hall following the 5 p.m. Mass.

Thanks to a generous donor, "The Winter Rose," arranged by Joseph Martin and directed by Ryan Neal, will be accompanied by a full orchestra and about 60 singers. It's not too late to join us! ## Ministry seeks to support marriages

Pete and Mary K. Rakytiak are on a mission to help parishioners strengthen their marriages.



They say more couples need to make time for one another and put God at their center.

Too often, they have seen couples' relationships suffer and dissolve because they let other things take priority. Broken marriages have a lasting impact on children, who most often get shuffled between


homes and lack the security of a stable family.

"The sacrament is so important to us," says Mary K. "We see so many families divided. We want what we have to be the norm again. It feels like it's slipping away. We want to do something."

The couple, who have been married 25 years and have three children (Justin, 22; Maddie, 18; and Elise, 14), are the leaders of the St. Francis Xavier Parish Marriage Ministry. The ministry exists to offer support through enrichment activities, such as an annual book study, a Mass and reception celebrating marriage, World Marriage Day and more.

"I see a lot of times the kids are first, but it's the excuse to take Billy to the soccer game and Sally to dance, and God's not first," says Pete. "We want to put God in the center of marriages first."

The couple hopes more parishioners will want to join them as they plan ways to help good marriages get even better, and suffering marriages to find the resources they need. The ministry is working to plan programs and promote conversation about common challenges within marriage, such




as dealing with conflict, relating to in-laws, communicating effectively, navigating personality differences and more.

The Rakytiaks says they were drawn to the ministry because it gave them an opportunity to meet new people, establish friendships with other couples and do something together.

"I was getting a lot out of the men's renewal thing, and we were doing individual ministries, when we thought, we've got to find something we can do together," Pete says.

The Rakytiaks encourage and invite all married couples to get involved and join them in this ministry. "Marriage is a blessed sacrament," Mary K. says. "Let's celebrate our marriages together."
