In a future Chicago, 16-year-old Beatrice must choose one faction among five, a decision made more difficult when she discovers that she does not fit into any one group. The plot contains graphic violence. Book #1

Trying to make sense of the horrors of World War II, Death relates the story of Liesel, a young German girl whose book-stealing and story-telling talents help sustain her family and the Jewish man they are hiding.

After a plane crash, thirteen-year-old Brian spends 54 days in the wilderness, learning to survive initially with only the aid of a hatchet given to him by his mother, and learning also to survive his parents' divorce.

Through journal entries, sixteen-year-old Miranda describes her family's struggle to survive after a meteor hits the Moon, causing worldwide tsunamis, earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions. Book #1

Summer Reading Assignment

Directions: Type your answers to the following questions and have them ready on the first day of school. Each answer should be supported by clear evidence from the book such as quotations, examples, and summaries of key scenes. Your answers should use correct spelling, punctuation, and grammar. This will be your first graded assignment of the school year.

1. What is the setting (time and place) of your book? What role did it play in the conflict of the story? How did it affect the plot?
2. Who are the main characters in your book? What are their most notable personality traits? Which character did you relate to the most? Why? (You cannot write none.)
3. How did one or more characters change? What made them change?
4. Which character would you want to meet? Why?
5. What was the main conflict (what did the character (s) want) in the story? What did they have to do to try to solve the conflict? What decisions did they make in solving the problem that you would have done differently and/or the same?
6. What did you think of the ending? What would you suggest the author change? If you think the ending is fine, what did you like about it?
7. What is a theme (underlying message about a topic, critical belief about life) in the book? How does this theme relate to your life experiences, other books that you have read, and society?
8. What is your general feeling about the book? Explain key passages from the book that made you feel this way. What would you say to someone who might want to read this book?
